COIDA: COMPENSATION FOR OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES AND DISEASES AMENDMENT ACT 10 OF 2022

The President has assented to the Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Amendment Act 10 of 2022, which was published for general information. The Act will take effect on a date fixed by the President by Proclamation in the Gazette.

The Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Amendment Act 10 of 2022 amends the Compensation for Occupational Injuries and Diseases Act, 1993 by inter alia, dealing with the following matters:

it amends, substitutes, inserts, deletes and repeals certain definitions and sections;

the Act provides for matters pertaining to the Board and its members;

it provides for the Commissioner to perform certain functions that were previously performed by the Director-General; the Act further provides for matters pertaining to the rehabilitation, re-integration and return to work of occupationally injured employees;

it regulates the use of health care services;

it provides for the Commissioner to review pension claims or awards;

it provides for administrative penalties; and

the Act regulates compliance and enforcement and provide for matters connected therewith.
